New, more impactful, science communications

In the Speech from the Throne on 23 September, 2020, the Governor General said that "we trust science to lead the fight." Yet only 83% of Canadians believe scientists, 48% think they are not as ethical as they should be, and as many as one third of Canadians report they are unlikely to get a COVID-19 vaccine when one becomes available.

If science is our best defence against COVID-19, how can we increase trust in science and improve communication of scientific results?
